From the Trustees

If you have been around the sanctuary and kitchen lately, you will have noticed a lot of painting in progress. The kitchen has had a complete fresh coat of paint. The result is a clean and bright space from which to carry out our hospitality activities. In fact it may even inspire you to host a coffee hour! The Trustees remind you that one of the main guidelines for the kitchen is - "carry in, carry out". We ask that you do not leave leftover food in the refrigerator and that you take home any dishes, plates, etc. that you bring in.

Painting is also going on in the sanctuary. Several sections of wall in the choir area have been stripped of peeling paint, sealed and primed. We are now waiting for our faux painter to come in and do the final coat just in time for Easter. The Trustees are thankful to fellow trustee Greg Haviland who has been behind all this work.

Update on the Nursery School renovations: Over the school break in February, the contractor was hard at work doing asbestos abatement in the education building. All the tile floors (two layers in auditorium) were removed from the main floor. In addition the stage has been taken out. Now construction on the new classrooms will begin. It is exciting to see this transformation taking place. We are grateful for the wonderful working relationship we have with the Nursery School board and their willingness to invest in our building. The result is mutually beneficial for both organizations. We will keep you updated as the project progresses.

As we move into spring and summer, you will see additional work going on in and around our buildings and grounds. All the Trustee projects are made possible by the generous people, past and present, who have given gifts to the endowment fund or remembered the endowment in their wills. The endowment is truly a blessing to this church.

Abundant Health

Spring is nearly here! Spring opens the door to renewal and "spring cleaning". That means more opportunities for the Walking Groupplease join us for walks along the Rye boardwalk on March 1 and March 15. It's a beautiful setting, you can try out the modern "swing" along the way and parking is free at Playland. Not only that, but your body and brain will enjoy walking along the water, hearing the waves and seeing the trees begin to bloom. We will meet at 1pm at the Children's Museum entrance on the boardwalk.

"Spring cleaning" has many meanings, not just cleaning out your home. For the last in our series, "Preparing for the Future", spring cleaning means thinking about your health care wishes, making decisions and putting your wishes down on paper. You may have noted that advance care decisions can be part of the Health Care Proxy form. Advance care planning begins with thinking about your values regarding health care treatments. We have many different medical treatments that can prevent illness and disease, other treatments that can provide temporary support until a person's body heals and is back to that person's normal, and, other treatments that possibly, may extend a person's life. Some people have watched loved ones go through life with medical treatments that they themselves would not want, other people may be confused or not understand what the medical treatment entails and, other people will seek guidance from their primary care provider, religious leader or friends.

Primary care providers would like to have discussions with a person/patient prior to a medical crisis or hospitalization. When a patient is clear about her/his values and the medical treatments desired or not wanted, care is focused on that patient's preferences. Primary care providers have a responsibility to outline for a patient how a patient's body is doing, how diseases impact that person's body and in many cases, what future health issues may evolve. No, we don't read your fortunes and except in a few circumstances, we can't tell you how long you will live!

Advances in health care technology and treatments may not be for everyone. As an example, did you know that CPR or cardio-pulmonary resuscitation was developed on the battlefield, in an attempt to save young soldiers' lives? CPR works best in younger people.

As CPR is done, a great deal of pressure is placed repeatedly on bones in the chest and for older people, those bones break very easily. When the heart stops, a person is clinically dead and CPR is an attempt to "bring them back" from being dead. While the success rate in a hospital is better than in the community due to available resources, it is not as good as you might see on Grey's Anatomy, The Good Doctor or any of the TV medical shows.

Consider what medical treatments you would want initiated, continued or removed if you were in a permanent coma or had little conscious understanding with no hope of recovery, had brain disease or brain damage with no hope that the condition would improve, had a terminal illness or had a psychiatric disorder. What are your thoughts about artificial nutrition and hydration, would you want to have these initiated or withheld, or continued or withdrawn, and under what types of circumstances?

Although the following are not a complete list of medical treatments you may wish to discuss with your primary care provider and health care proxy, they are a starting point: artificial respiration (on a ventilator- a machine that assists your lungs in breathing), cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR), artificial nutrition and hydration, antipsychotic medication, electric shock therapy, antibiotics, surgical procedures, dialysis, transplantation, blood transfusions, abortions and sterilization. Consider if you want to donate any part of your body including tissue and genes to another person and/or medical research.

Once you've made your decisions write them down on a health care proxy form, or a Five Wishes Form or have a lawyer draw up a will with your specific wishes identified. And then, give that form to your health care proxy and primary care provider. While a discussion about your wishes with your family and/or closest friends is ideal, it may not be a plan for everyone.

Check it out: Being Mortal: Rights, Choices and Important Conversations at the Larchmont Public Library on Monday, March 16 at 7pm in the Village Center section of the library.
